Dear Parents/Carers,

The Children and Young Person's (Care and Protection) Act 1998

Parents need to be aware that as teachers in the state of NSW we are required by law to report certain information to the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ). Reports to the Child Protection Helpline (Ph. 132 111, 24 hrs/7 days) must be made where we have reasonable grounds to suspect that a child or young person is at risk of significant harm and our concerns are current. Risk of significant harm may occur from a single act or omission or to a series of acts or omissions.

We can get help to determine whether we need to report by using the DCJ online Mandatory Reporters Guide: https://reporter.childstory.nsw.gov.au/s/

Social Media

A reminder to be vigilant with your children and their activity on social media. If you're not a user of social media but your children are, please investigate so that you understand what is happening and what they are seeing. All social media is meant to be for children older than 13 because they are more likely to have the social maturity to deal with it, although we've all heard cases where even older children don't have those skills. End of year awards

With COVID restrictions, it has been difficult for us these last 2 years to join as a community to celebrate the end of our school year. Thankfully this year, restrictions have lifted, and we will come together at our school from 9:45am on Monday 12 December.

We are unable to secure any off-site venues (such as St Joseph's College Hall) as we have done in the past hence, we are trialling a change of venue and time. As we do as a Catholic community, we will begin with a liturgy to celebrate all the blessings bestowed on us throughout our 2022 school year. This will also include the naming of our 2023 school and sports leaders (from our year 6 2023 cohort).

As is our practice at Rosary Park grade (K-6) teachers will then give out awards to selected children in their class. Year 6 awards will be given out at their graduation night. These awards are presented for:

*Faith and Service Award (Rosary Park medal awarded to two children/class each year): Knowing what it means to be a child of God and demonstrating this through their actions

*Rosary Park Award for Learning (Rosary Park medal awarded to two children/class each year): Recognising students that use their strengths and gifts as a learner – letting their light shine as a learner in any Key Learning Area (KLA-subject) at any level. This award focuses on growth, persistence, and grit. These award recipients are **NOT** necessarily the best academic achievers in their class but more those children who work consistently and persistently to achieve their personal best.

Parents, grandparents, and friends are welcome to join us for this celebration on 12 December. We will contact families of awards recipients before the day (<u>NOT</u> those receiving a student leader role for 2023) so that they can attend this event if they wish. These parents will be given priority seating on the day as will year 5 parents whose children are part of leadership nominations (2 seats/child).

Obviously, seating will be at a premium so we will prioritise families whose children are receiving awards and we will live stream the event and provide seating for extended family members and friends in classrooms on this day, so the event can be viewed 'live' at the school or at home. We ask for parents and families understanding and flexibility with this as we cannot accommodate all parents in the Hall/COLA area.

These were held over 4 weeks and gave parents and children the opportunity to visit in both large and small groups, becoming more familiar and comfortable with their new school setting. I thank Grace Dever and Alanna Seysener (Kindergarten 2023 teachers) and Tiffany Nolan (Learning Support Teacher) for the enormous amount of work they put into these sessions. Any feedback on these sessions is always appreciated.

Staffing

Advanced Notice

In 2023, our year 5 students will attend Great Aussie Bush Camp 7-9 June 2023 (approx. cost \$390/child) whilst our year 6 students will have their excursion to Canberra on 20, 21, 22 June (approx. cost \$450/child). As these excursions are a significant financial commitment for families (not covered by our resource fee), I am giving you advanced notice so that you are able to budget for them.

This is a social media app where you add friends and can ask questions anonymously with no way for members to know who has asked the question. As you can imagine, this can cause issues with school aged children who are screenshotting questions and responses and posting them on tiktok. Please ask your children about the app and ensure that you are supervising your child's online or social media interactions.

Year 6 News

Year 6 have returned to school this term with the end of their primary schooling in their grasps. They have been working hard to finish their last year of primary school in a cohesive and positive manner. They have been busy little bees doing all things graduation and are waiting excitedly in anticipation of this momentous occasion!


English


In English this semester, year 6 have been focusing on improving comprehension skills whilst reading and engaging with a novel. Each group is given the same novel to read for the Term.

We have introduced **Literature Circles**. A literature circle is a small group of learners who come together to discuss a piece of literature (text) in depth. The discussion is guided by the learner's response to what they have read. It provides a way for learners to engage in critical thinking and reflection as they read, discuss, and respond to books.

Each week groups are given a comprehension role to complete after reading a few chapters of their novel. Students then come together on Fridays to share in deep, analytical discussion of the chapters read. Students not only work on their comprehension skills but also reading and viewing and speaking and listening skills too whilst sharing their role.

An example of two of the roles are displayed below based off an example chapter in Mr. Stink by David Walliams.







Maths

In maths, we have been implementing <u>launch</u>, <u>explore</u>, <u>summarise</u>. Students work in small mixed ability groups, learning from each other to solve problems or equations based on a topic of learning.

During the *launch* and *explore* stage students work on skills such as working mathematically, explaining their working, and reasoning their answers. During this time, students also work on skills such as speaking and listening and communicating with each other.

In the summarising stage, students come together as a whole class to discuss the multiple strategies used within their group to solve the problem or equation. During this time, students connect their ideas which were discussed in small groups with the ideas of others. Students are given the opportunity to communicate with the rest of the class how they solved the problem and what worked for them. The teacher then takes time to unpack and explain how each group solve the problem, ensuring students understand the strategy discussed.

IN THIS ISSUE

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Energiser of the term- Warm up Apples

Scheduling short classroom 'brain breaks' or energisers can increase student focus, concentration, and create an engaging learning environment that contributes to student wellbeing.

Here's how to play:

Go through the actions of each apple. Once students know the actions the leader calls out the type of apple and the students do the actions.

- · Crab apple walk sideways like a crab
- · Green apple crouch down
- Fuji apple mountain shape with arms over head
- Apple jelly jiggle and wiggle
- · Apple crisp straight rigid bodies
- · Apple juice stomp the apples
- · Apple pear pair up with a neighbour
- · Apple turnover 'the wave' across the room, hands up everyone!

Change it up: start slow and then call out the type of apples faster and faster to get students thinking and moving.

Fruit salad cup

Serves: 4

Acknowledgement: Sourced from Cancer Council: Healthy Lunchbox Fresh Fruit Yoghurt Recipe

Ingredients:

1 large watermelon wedge, chopped into pieces

6 strawberries, chopped into pieces 1 apple, chopped into pieces

- 1 mandarin, peeled and segmented 1 kiwi fruit, peeled chopped into pieces
- 2 cups of reduced fat natural yoghurt*



Method:

Combine all the fruit and then divide into 4 serves. Top each serve with ½ cup of reduced fat natural yoghurt. *Gluten free if using gluten free yoghurt.
