Parent-Teacher Communication

Communication between school and home is so important. We value your insights in working closely with us to develop your child academically, socially, and emotionally.

To this end in <u>weeks 1 and 2 of term 2</u> we will be allocating time slots via Compass for you to book in for a 10-minute *phone interview* with your child's teacher should you wish to have one. There may also be some families who do not book a time, but the teacher may request a time with you to discuss some matters with you.

These calls are an opportunity to discuss your child's learning progress as well as their social and emotional development, in addition to any concerns we (or you) may have.

These phone calls will be in addition to our student led conferences on Monday 1 July-pupil free day. These conferences are an opportunity for your child to lead the conversation about their learning, to discuss their progress to date and their future goals.

Please look out on Compass as we advertise bookings for these phone calls later this term.

Teacher Professional Learning

Last Saturday ten teachers from Rosary Park attended the annual ICTENSW DigiTLL conference (Digital Teaching, Learning & Literacies) at the Australian Catholic University North Sydney

Creative and Critical thinking is a School Improvement Plan goal for our school. The teachers who attended this conference found the workshops on digital literacy, using digital strategies to support student learning and Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and technology in a differentiated primary classroom particularly valuable to apply to our practice at Rosary Park.

The keynote speakers and workshops across the day covered areas of the new K-6 Mathematics and English syllabi and how we can integrate technology into these new areas of learning.

I thank the large number of teachers who gave up a day of their weekend to attend this learning opportunity for our children.

Sport Representative Trials

Each year there are Winter and Summer trials held in various sports for those children who play at representative level and have the potential to follow the sporting pathway to the highest level of representation (Polding level). Whilst we give all children who play these sports the chance to participate in the school trial, only those considered elite in their chosen sport can be selected. As a result, only children in year 5-6 are invited to trial. Where possible an independent selector is invited to convene the trial especially for those popular sports so there is transparency.

Most sports are a regional trial, however Rugby League, AFL & Rugby Union are an immediate diocesan trial so only 3 students are selected <u>IF</u> they are seen as having skills to play at the elite level.

We are normally able to send 3-6 students to the next level of trial, however these children must be able to demonstrate and prove their representative credentials at the various level of trials. In any trial we are NOT permitted to send children who do not meet the selection criteria.

Sporting representative levels in Maitland-Newcastle diocese:

Regional. Rosary Park is in the Lower Hunter region. Children compete against others from Catholic schools in our local area including Rutherford, Maitland, East Maitland, Kurri Kurri/Abermain, Cessnock, Dungog, Lochinvar, Tarro and Chisholm.

The next level up is **Diocesan** representation. Children compete against all children from Catholic Schools in the Maitland Newcastle area – 44 primary schools.

Polding is the highest level of Catholic representation, competing against all other Catholic primary school students from NSW.

In our last newsletter we included information from Catholic Schools NSW (CSNSW) in regard to representative sport. Please visit csnsw.sport if you need more information on the pathways for sport. Our school website also contains information on representative sport (under news and Events).

Throughout the school year, we will participate in some gala days/competitions in different sports. The focus of these days is participation, and the aim is to give children equal game time. As sport is one part of a busy extra curricula and we strive to provide children with opportunities in Creative Arts and other areas, it is not possible for us to compete in every gala day offered. Please contact us if you require further clarification.

Leading Learning Collaborative: "Clarity" by Dr Lyn Sharratt

The Diocese of Maitland Newcastle is focusing all schools in contemporary learning and the effective use of data.

This year Rosary Park continues working with Dr Lyn Sharratt, an educationalist from Canada who has been engaged by the Catholic Schools Office to work with schools.

On April 3, Dr Sharratt will visit Rosary Park along with a group of teachers from other schools to see first-hand our work in this area.

In addition, all schools have employed Pedagogical Mentors who act as mentors for other staff. Amber Van Duuren and Janelle Dixon are in this role this year at Rosary Park. Throughout this year, they will receive professional development on this role and how-to best work with staff to improve outcomes for our students.

Our learning focus for 2024 is on improving teaching & learning in Mathematics.

In her book 'Clarity' Lyn Sharratt emphasises fourteen parameters that are needed to improve teaching and learning in a school. The important role that parents play in their child's education is one of these key parameters. Here are five questions that she suggests parents can ask their children when engaging with them about their learning:

- 1. What did you learn today?
- 2. How did you do?
- 3. What did you do if you didn't understand?
- 4. How can you improve on your learning?
- 5. What are you most proud of?

In 2023, we introduced Student Lead conferences as part of our approach to giving children autonomy in their learning and articulating their learning goals based on peer and teacher feedback.

On <u>Monday 1 July (pupil free day)</u> you will be invited to school to participate with your child and their teacher in this. Please keep this date available in your diary as we expect all families to attend.

Professional Learning Team (PLT) Meetings

As part of our work with 'Clarity' Professional Learning Team meetings for teachers, working with our Pedagogical Mentors, have already started for 2024. In term 2, PLTs will occur in half day allocations, with teachers off class half a day in week 3,6, 9 of term 2. Teachers work together in analysing student data in Maths and work as a team to devise teaching strategies to further improve student performance.

This is part of our School Improvement Plan (SIP) and there is some allocation from the system to supplement the expense of casual staff wages for this.

Office of Safeguarding - Our diocesan and school commitment

Keeping our children safe can be achieved by ensuring our children are informed about their rights and participate in decision-making. Adults need to ensure they listen actively to children and engage them in discussions. This will help children feel valued and respected, which will help them to speak up if they feel they are unsafe or have been abused. At Rosary Park, the voice of each child is respected and valued, we have many opportunities for children to be involved in teams and activities to build our community. Encourage your child to participate in these activities such as:

- *Lunch clubs (wellbeing, Minecraft)
- * School band for Years 3-6
- *Ukulele group for year 2 (term 2)
- *Leadership Teams (termly meetings with their team and the principal)

Daily Roll Marking and School Attendance

Aside from our Wednesday assembly day, we are in classrooms marking class rolls on Compass as we begin our learning for the day. So, it is important that your child is at school on time or that you mark them absent (for full day absences only – not partial absences) via Compass promptly in the morning. Otherwise, you will receive the automated unexplained absence text message by 9:30am.

It is extremely important that children <u>attend school every day.</u> Days off school not only contribute to significant gaps and lost opportunities in learning, it is also hard for children to establish, develop and maintain social connections. Unless it is <u>absolutely necessary</u>, please do not schedule holidays during school time. Unless an emergency, medical appointments should be scheduled for school holidays.

If your child is not at school for a **valid** reason, parents are expected to log into Compass and give explanation for their absence within 7 school days. If you do not do this, you will be notified by the admin staff to explain your child's absence, although if it is past the seven-day window, it remains an 'unexplained/unjustified' absence on the class roll.

If your child has continued unexplained absences, you will be contacted by the school to explain these and asked to attend a meeting at school to work on formulating an attendance plan.

Drop off/Pick up Times

The crossing supervisor begins at **8:15 am** daily. Any child who needs to be at school before this, must attend OOSH. Playground staff start duty at 8:30am. It is expected that children are collected by 3:30pm in the afternoons. Thank you for your co-operation with this.

Harmony Week





Memory is 26 years old and lives in rural Malawi. As the eldest child in a low-income farming family, Memory had to take on many household chores and farming activities to support her parents. They struggled to pay for Memory's school fees and school supplies, and Memory often had to walk to school barefooted.

With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner the Catholic Development Commission in Malawi (CADECOM), Memory was able to enrol at a technical college where she learnt technical skills in carpentry. She undertook a three-year carpentry course, with CADECOM supporting part of her tuition and boarding fees.



Memory became the first female carpenter from her village. Today, she works as a carpenter at one of Malawi's largest hydroelectric power stations. With the income from her job, she can provide financial support to her family and inspire other young women in her community so that they may have the opportunity to succeed in a male-dominated industry.

On Wednesday the 6th of March we were very lucky to have a visit from Snr Constable Michael Steele to teach our year 5 and 6 students about Cyber Safety. During the chat we asked some students to take notes on what they felt was important for our community to know. Please have a read through their notes and maybe have a chat at home about being cybersafe.

- Social media age is 13.
- 60% of parents don't like their children using social media.
- Criminals can find out a lot about you from your social media posts like what you have in your house, who is in your family and when/where you are on holidays.
- There are soft wares that allow criminals to access your camera even if your device is off. It is best to cover your camera when you are not using your device and keep devices out of your bedroom.
- TikTok collects your biometrics (most commonly, a way to identify you through fingerprinting and retinal scanning however it can also be ear shape, eye shape, voice and much more).
- TikTok (13+) is free because it collects so much of your data.
- After the age of 10 you can be charged for criminal offenses such as cyber bullying, pretending to be another person online or having child pornography on your phone - even if it was sent to you from a friend.
- In high school it is common for people to send each other inappropriate photographs (nudes). The Police call this child pornography. If you receive or distribute child pornography it can lead to criminal charges.
- Kids as young as 10 are being targeted through social media platforms which include online games like GTA (18+) and Call of Duty (MA15+).
- Social media platforms key-log what you type, including your passwords. That's why if you search for something suddenly ads for it are all over your social media.
- Social media is affecting children's attention spans. 70% of children do not have the attention span to watch a movie.
- A good way to decide if you should post something is the GRANDMA test. Miss Burgess told us if you wouldn't show it to your Grandma... don't post it online!








In Year 6 we have been learning about Aboriginal art being traditional and modern. Aboriginal art is modern and evolving every day. This week we looked at Scar Trees which have been a traditional practice of the Kamilaroi people for thousands of years. Scar trees are caused by the removal of bark to make various tools such as Coolamons. The Kamilaroi people would also carve their signature patterns into the trees to mark burial sites or other sites of significance. Our learning intention was "We are learning to represent ourselves through the use of patterns and symbols". We took inspiration from traditional Kamilaroi people and painted our own scar trees. We enjoyed completing our learning outside in our yarning circle and connecting with the beautiful Wonnarua Country.

The School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.



If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

If the student already has a School Opal card and is changing schools, campuses or home address, you will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at

How to apply

Applications for next year open at the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed your child's enrolment, complete the application at transportnsw.info/school-students

Step 2

The school endorses your application.

Step 3

Once Transport for NSW has approved the application, a School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.



A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over can apply for themselves.



Better together

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits

- · Concession fares across the Opal network
- Half-price travel after eight paid journeys each week*
- \$1 transfer discount for every transfer between modes (metro/train, ferry, bus or light rail) as part of one journey within 60 minutes from the last tap off[†]
- Set auto top up and link it to your credit or debit card so there's always enough value on the card to travel.
