STAFFING CHANGES

We farewell Miss Chloe Morgan as she and her partner, Isaac, await the impending birth of their first child, due in November. Thank you for your wonderful work in Year Four and for your service to Rosary Park, Miss Morgan. We cannot wait for the news!

Her replacement for Term 4 at this stage, will be Miss Nellie Connolly. Miss Connolly is currently employed at Corpus Christi, Waratah and has a special education background. We look forward to her arrival.

MOBILE PHONE AND WEARABLE TECHNOLOGIES AT ROSARY PARK

As part of the Catholic Schools commitment to safety, the Diocese has re-written a Mobile Phone and Wearable Technology Procedure.

As part of these procedures, Rosary Park have undertaken the process of updating our documentation.

As of TERM FOUR (October 13, 2025), Rosary Park Branxton will be a "SWITCHED OFF AND AWAY" school.

What does this mean?

This means all Mobile Phones and Wearable Technologies will be 'off and away' during school hours.

Students will be responsible for switching off their Mobile Phone/s and or Wearable Technology/s upon entering school grounds and storing safely it/them in their bag or locker during school hours.

Should a student choose to keep their watch on, then it must be set to SLEEP, DO NOT DISTURB or SCHOOL MODES. This means that the watch is unable to make calls, receive messages or take photos.

<u>Students MUST have their phones SWITCHED OFF and IN THEIR BAGS or IN THE OFFICE. There are NO exceptions to this rule for phones.</u>

Students are not permitted to remove their Mobile Phone and or Wearable Technology/s from storage to use during school hours including designated breaks.

They may switch on their mobile phones and wearable technologies upon the conclusion of school hours after they exit school grounds.

How can Parents Help?

In order to assist in the effective management of this plan, <u>Parents/Carers should refrain from</u> <u>contacting their child on their personal mobile phone/s and wearable technology/s during school hours</u>, in order to maintain a safe productive learning environment for all students.

If a parent/carer wishes to contact their child during school hours, they may contact the school via phone. In school related settings, please refer to the event details for contact processes and details.

How will the procedure be regulated?

As per our school behaviour management procedure, any breaches of this policy, management plan and user agreement will result in disciplinary action.

1st Warning – Phone or Wearable Technology is to be placed in bag – documented in Compass

2nd Warning – Phone or Wearable Technology is held securely at the Office until the end of the day – documented in Compass and email sent home to parents.

3rd Warning – Phone or Wearable Technology is held and parent to come and collect (given back to student at the conclusion of the day) – documented in Compass and phone call / email to parents. Yellow Card

Any further breaches of the Plan will result in a Red Card and a parent meeting to discuss support which may be required.

Japanese School Visit

A few weeks ago, we had a visit from students and teachers who attend Izumigaoka Junior High School, in Ide Town Japan. The students were staying with families from St. Joseph's College at Lochinvar. The two schools have a sister school agreement and have been alternating visits since 2012.

During their day with us our students taught them some favourite Aussie sports including cricket, soccer and netball. At assembly the Japanese students and teachers gave a presentation showing us what school is like in Japan and performed a dance. We shared lunch time and after lunch the Japanese students taught Year 5 and 6 children how to make origami animals. It was wonderful to see the students finding ways to communicate and enjoy time together despite the language barrier. It was a great experience for all involved to learn about language and culture. We hope to continue this tradition when they visit St. Joseph's again in 2027.

Uniform

We still have a number of children without hats at school and a number of items in the lost property box. Please ensure all items that come to school are clearly labelled, including lunch boxes and drink bottles. Names tend to fade over time. We would appreciate it if parents could check, and rewrite faded names before the children return to school next term.

Children without a hat will be limited to playing under the sheltered areas of the playground.

Hairstyles

Hair must be neat and tidy. Please be mindful when visiting the hairdressers in the holidays, in keeping with the school tone, hairstyles should not be outlandish - no Mohawks, tracks or rat tails. Extremes of style and colour are not appropriate. Layering of hair or changes in length from front

to back should be subtle and blended through. Children with long hair past their collar, should have it tied back in a band.

Holiday Learning

Don't forget to keep learning during the holiday break. There are many simple ways to continue the learning for your child/children during the holidays. Never underestimate the impact of participating in simple learning games and activities with your child/children.

For younger children

- Identify numbers and letters/words in the environment when driving in the car, walking around town or at the shops
- Play karaoke let children read the words and sing, this builds graphological or picture (what a word looks like) knowledge to assist reading and spelling
- Build multiplication knowledge identify grids or arrays in the environment how many rows and how many columns
- Cook together talk about mass the meaning of kg, g, l, ml etc
- Use adjectives (describing words) to describe some objects in nature who can think of the most describing words
- If you must watch something on a screen, turn on subtitles for more exposure to print
- Count down the days of the holidays on a calendar
- Use an analogue clock to identify bedtime, bath time etc Where is the big hand? What does it mean when the big hand is on 6? etc
- Categorise objects using various criteria eg. Size, shape, colour, manmade/natural
- Use items in the environment to create an artwork

For older children

- Estimate the total of a group of objects in the trolley
- Calculate the cost of a day out movie tickets plus the cost of lunch for the whole family etc
- Cook together double or halve the ingredients in a recipe to allow for more/less people
- Read the instructions to a new game
- Read a book with your child you read left hand pages, and they read the right
- Design an outdoor obstacle course and time how long it takes to complete the activities can you get faster over the holidays?
- Use a calendar
- Tell the time on an analogue clock

End of Term

As we come to the end of term 3, teachers are busy planning engaging classroom programs across the curriculum to help children achieve their identified goals. Year 5 Leadership Changes to the process:

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR PARNTS OF YEAR 5 & 6 STUDENTS

Student BYOD Devices important message: Windows 10 is reaching end of life

Action is required for students with BYOD Windows 10 devices as Windows 10 will soon no longer be supported by Microsoft.

To ensure your student device security you should upgrade to Windows 11 as soon as possible. Microsoft has announced that support for Windows 10 will end on 14 October 2025, meaning it will no longer receive critical security updates.

To stay protected and ensure optimal performance, it is strongly recommended that all students with BYOD Windows 10 devices follow Microsoft's instructions and upgrade to Windows 11 as soon as possible. There is no charge for this upgrade.

- We ask that all families with Student Windows 10 computers complete this process before 15 October 2025 so that students do not experience disruptions to their learning.
- Most newer devices will support Windows 11.
- If the device is too old, you may need to consider an alternative supported device (where possible).
- If you need assistance or have questions about upgrading, please reach out to the IT support team in our school.

Why this matters:

- Microsoft will stop supporting Windows 10 from 15 October 2025.
- Upgrading to Windows 11 ensures your child's device remains secure and supported.
- **Student Work Protection**: Staying current helps safeguard assignments, projects, and personal data.

How do I check what version of Windows am I running?

 Select Start > Settings > System, then select About. You then see Edition, Version, and OS Build information.

What if my device can't upgrade?

If a Student's BYOD laptop is running **Windows 10** and **can't be upgraded to Windows 11** (usually due to older hardware), Microsoft is offering a **free security update program** to help keep the device safe for **one more year.**

The Windows 10 Extended Security Updates (ESU) program is designed to keep your current Windows 10 PC protected after support ends, helping you stay secure during the transition.

How to Join Microsoft's ESU Program

Microsoft has made it easy to enrol directly from the laptop:

- On eligible computers, a setup wizard will appear in Settings > Windows Update.
- There are three ways to enrol:
- 1. **Free** Sync your settings to the cloud using Windows Backup. You must be logged in as administrator and with a Microsoft account.
- 2. Free Use 1,000 Microsoft Rewards points.
- 3. **Paid** Buy a one-year license for **\$30 USD** (families cover this cost).

Child Care Subsidy

Did you know you are entitled to a discount of up to 90% off your fees through the Australian Government's Child Care Subsidy? To ensure you receive your entitled subsidy, remember to confirm your OCS enrolment via the Centrelink website or app.

Cancellations and Absence

To change your booking, simply reach out to the St Nicholas OOSH service you requested a booking for. Please note, our cancellation policy requires notice of five (5) business days for cancellation of Vacation Care bookings. If you cancel within 5 business days of your booking, you will be charged the full rate. If your child is sick or otherwise unable to attend for one of your bookings, please let us know with as much notice as possible by phoning or texting the service's mobile number, Please note, you will still be liable for any fees incurred on this day. If children are unwell, please refrain from bringing them to care.

Risk assessments are completed for all excursions and are available onsite for viewing. An OOSH staff member can provide a copy of any risk assessments to parents/ caregivers upon request.

First Nations recipe - Kangaroo Spaghetti

Preparation time: 10 minutes Cooking time: 25 minutes

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 600g kangaroo mince
- 500g fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 1 brown onion, diced
- 1 large green capsicum, sliced
- 1 bunch of celery, sliced
- 1 can diced tomatoes
- 4 cups cooked pasta
- 1 tbsp tomato paste
- Parsley to garnish

Method:

- 1. Heat olive oil in a frying pan
- 2. Brown mince then add onions, mushroom, celery, capsicum and cook for 10 minutes
- 3. Add the canned tomato and tomato paste and simmer for 5 minutes
- 4. Boil the pasta until cooked
- 5. Serve the mince on top of the cooked pasta and garnish with parsley
